Sabbatical Reflection #2

During my Sabbatical I read several books, one was called **Healing our Haunted Histories: A Settler Discipleship of Decolonization**. The book asks us to look at our own stories and family histories and acknowledge the suffering or sadness and ask how it has been dealt with or not. It also invites us to look for ways that our ancestors interacted with Indigenous people and whether or not they benefited from the mistreatment of Indigenous peoples.

The book tells the story of one of the author's Mennonite family's journey from Ukraine to California as a model, but really emphasizes the goal that we all explore our own family's stories and how they continue to impact us to this day. I took this prompting and reread my grandfather's autobiography, as well as some musings my grandmother wrote and gave the grandchildren awhile back. It became a journey into awareness and understanding of their lives, but also in light of the other book I was reading, it was fascinating to notice the little side notes here and there about the other cultures they encountered, like the Indigenous, French or Jews.

One such story is that of my great great grandparents, Sarah and Jacob. Sarah came to Canada around 1875 and was married shortly after and had 2 children. Then in 1879 Her husband, his brother, and their friend Jacob Gerbrandt along with others traveled to the West Reserve to stake out new homesteads. At some point they interacted with the Indigenous people of the area and were warned not to try to cross the Rat River when it was so high. Unfortunately, they did not listen and on their way home they tried to ford the swollen Rat River, and Sarah's husband and his brother both drowned in the process. Jacob Gerbrandt was left to tell Sarah the tragic news. Later Jacob and Sarah married and they moved to their homestead on the West Reserve southwest of Altona.

This is a tragic story that has been used to explain Sarah's melancholy nature all her life. But when looked at from a cross cultural perspective there are many details left out; like, who were those Indigenous people? How did they know them? And what other wisdom was shared?

I don't know the answers to these questions, and I may never find them. But this story shows knowledge and kindness offered to my ancestors from Indigenous peoples and I will continue to ponder and that dynamic.
