FROM THE PASTOR: Mark Tiessen-Dyck

A couple weeks ago I attended an event called "Returning Wealth—Land Reparations and the Church". It was planned by the Mennonite Coalition on Indigenous Solidarity and held at Fort Garry Mennonite Fellowship. The event was well attended (close to 150 people) with people from most Mennonite Church Manitoba Churches (and many other churches) in attendance. The purpose of this gathering was to explore what it could look like for churches to act toward repairing the harms that the colonization of our country has caused Indigenous communities.

The keynote speaker, Sarah Augustine, an Indigenous and Mennonite person from Washington State, shared this thought experiment: You are a guest in someone's home and behave recklessly and break a precious vase which had been a family heirloom. What would it look like to make reparations? Buying a replacement vase at the dollar store? Definitely not. Gluing the broken pieces back together as best you can? Not really. How to repair the harm done would need to be determined by the person who lost the vase. Conversations would need to happen. Relationships maintained and developed. Imagination cultivated.

Such is the opportunity before people and churches committed to repentance, righting past wrongs, and reconciliation. At the event we heard from churches that are working at reparations through relationships and financial commitments such as: granting the use of church facilities to Indigenous groups without cost, walking with the Bear Clan, involvements in Thunderbird House, and committing a percentage of the church's budget to Indigenous organizations and/or reparations funds.

Our church's participation in a Blanket Exercise was part of this movement toward reconciliation. This experience helped us to visualize and comprehend a history and reality we may have heard about but not yet grappled with. This in turn could open our hearts and our imaginations.

This is difficult subject matter and we are unsettled when we are confronted with a history that implicates our people in societal sins and names that we have benefited from these sins. Despite this, the event reminded me that this conversation and process is one of hope. Emotions of guilt, despair, and our natural defensiveness arise, but more importantly this is an opportunity to be part of a different future and a better story. I'm grateful to God for the opportunity to share and live in this hope.

Indigenous Relations: MMIWG final report. Back in September, the regional siblings of Mennonite Church Canada released a joint statement (https://www.mennonitechurch.ca/article/16049) supporting the landfill search in Winnipeg, Manitoba. At the end of October, the newly elected Premier of Manitoba, Wab Kinew, met with and apologized to the families of two slain First Nations women whose remains are believed to be in a Winnipeg-area landfill. Kinew met with the families of Morgan Harris and Marcedes Myran to reset the relationship between the two families and the government. We pray for those involved in discerning the path forward, holding in the light all the MMIWG families grieving the loss of loved ones, and commitment of all of Canada to realize the recommendations (https://www.mmiwg-ffada.ca/final-report/) which seeks to end violence against Indigenous women.
