# FROM THE PASTOR: Terrell Wiebe

Each month our youth groups have an event called youth talk night on our theme for the year, "God loves your...". The purpose of this series is to discuss things about ourselves that we often think are negative (failures, anger, weirdness, etc.) and reframe them in light of how God sees us. This past week we spoke about anger. Here is an hour-long conversation broken down into 350 words.

**Terrell: What makes you angry?** Youth: Other kids at school, siblings, rudeness, the state of the world, etc.

**T:** Is it okay to be angry? Y: Sometimes, as long as you don't lose control. It should be a last resort.

T: Let's look at a few things the Bible has to say about anger: "Refrain from anger and turn from wrath" - Psalm 37:8; "Whoever is slow to anger has great understanding," - Proverbs 14:29; "In your anger do not sin," -**Ephesians 4:26** 

Y: Even though there are differences here, these generally seem to line up with what we said earlier.

T: Can we be angry with God? Y: Maybe? There seem to be some people in the Bible who are.

T: Right! There are plenty of examples in scripture. God rarely rebukes those who are angry with God. It seems like anger at God is often an expression of dismay that these biblical characters thought God would act differently. It is a much greater act of faith to be angry with God than to ignore God because anger shows that we still believe God to be present and active in the world.

T: What about when Jesus and God are angry? The anger of Jesus in the temple (Matt 21:12-14) and God's anger in the Old Testament (Amos 5:21-24) have to do with people experiencing injustice. When the widow and the orphan are not taken care of and the poor are not lifted up, God and Jesus display anger.

T: Perhaps anger, when used properly, is a gift from God. Anger is the great motivator towards change. When things are not as they should be, we can match our anger with God's anger to create change and build God's kingdom here on earth.

Youth are invited to rewrite a psalm of anger towards God in their own words or write a letter to God expressing their anger over something in their lives or in the world.

T: Let's pray. Thank you, God, for the gift of anger and that you are a God who listens to our anger. We pray for your help to not engage in anger that destroys, and we ask for courage to express the kind of anger that builds your kingdom. Amen.

# Mennonite Church Manitoba weekly congregational profile:

Gretna Bergthaler Mennonite Church is the only church in Gretna, a small community south of Altona, just north of the U.S. border, and home to Mennonite Collegiate Institute. Their Sunday morning attendance is usually 20-30, though they have seen this number climb a bit during this last year. A women's Bible study has just started and, with many young families in town, they hope to get a children's Sunday school going this fall. At this point they are operating without a paid pastor. The bulk of the preaching is covered by two members and a member of the community. Everyone pitches in to keep things running. Pray that they would be a welcoming community to those in Gretna who do not currently have a church to attend.
