FROM THE PASTOR: Terrell Wiebe

In honour of Mennonite Heritage Week – the second week of September as declared by the Canadian parliament in 2019.

In his book, *Mennonites in Canada, 1939-1970*, T.D. Regher tells the story of a conflict that occurred amongst Mennonites in Altona and the surrounding area. The conflict centered on where churches ought to spend their financial resources during times of economic depression. David Shultz, long time elder of the Bergthaler Mennonite Church of Manitoba advocated for church established programs like the *Waisenamt* (Orphan's fund) and *Feuerversicherung* (fire insurance), among others, which the Bergthaler church had established to support the weakest of its members to protect their dignity and self worth. The other option, backed by J.J. Siemens, was secular co-ops like the Rhineland Agricultural Society which owed much to the Mennonite tradition of mutual aid but was based on socialist views that sought to protect community interests. The conflict was framed as a choice between strengthening the congregation (Shultz) or strengthening the rural community (Siemens).

While we are at an entirely different point in history, it strikes me that congregations still wrestle with the decision of support. How much do we spend on programs that give life to our church, and how much do we give programs that provide life to the community? Does it make a difference to us if those outside programs are based on biblical principles or not?

Many of us are gathering at Camp Assiniboia for a weekend of community building and worship this weekend. This can certainly be filed under the "strengthening the congregation" category. Meanwhile, the community meals we support could be filed under the "strengthening the community" category. I see it as encouraging that our congregation finds it important to support both ideologies of strengthening the congregation and strengthening the community. How would you assess where our support goes? What other lessons do we have to learn from Mennonite history in our area?

Fort Garry Mennonite Fellowship- FGMF was *formed in 1967. Its founding members adopted a "team ministry" model for* their polity, and instead of a constitution formulated a "covenant." There are no hired pastors, but rather lay ministers who serve for set terms. Most (though not all) of our members fellowship in "K-Groups," ensuring that pastoral and other concerns do not easily fall between the cracks. While the pandemic reduced the scale of our programing, 60-100 people attend services every Sunday, along with a significant group on Zoom. The four-part harmony singing of hymns from Voices Together is a regular feature. We would appreciate prayers for those in our congregation who are unable to attend our worship service in person, and for our children's Sunday School leaders working through post-pandemic challenges.
